PE AND SPORTS PREMIUM 2017-2018

The primary PE and Sports Premium that was introduced in September 2013, goes directly to primary school leaders so that they can decide how best to provide sporting activities for pupils. A one form entry primary school with pupils in Year 1-Year 6 this year received around £16,000, the equivalent of around 4 days a week of a coach's time - enough to make sure there is opportunity for additional and sustainable improvements to every pupil's health and their active lifestyles.

SPORTS PREMIUM PLAN:

- ✓ Invest in quality coaching to up level skills for pupils and train staff.
- ✓ Provide more opportunities for pupils to take part in inter-school and intra school competitions.
- ✓ Offer a wider range of after school clubs by expert coaches.
- ✓ Invest in more and better sports equipment.
- ✓ Provide opportunities to try new sports and activities.
- ✓ Broaden the range of sporting opportunities.



OUTCOMES:

- The school provides opportunities for all children to lead active and healthy lifestyles.
- There is additional sport and PE provision that is sustainable because staff are equipped to teach effectively through appropriate training and resources and specialist groups support the school provision.
- To maintain bronze school games award and move towards silver award.



MONITORING:

The impact will be monitored by the PE leader and the Headteacher. Monitoring will include observations of teaching and extra-curricular clubs to ensure that provision is of a high quality and that take up for each activity is appropriate.

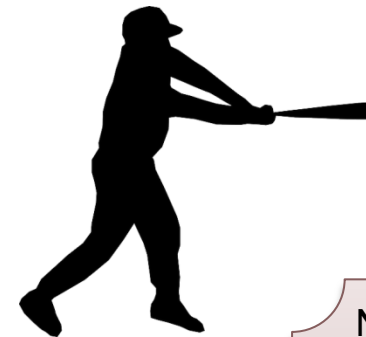

SPORTS PREMIUM PLAN:	Achievements
Up-skill teachers to improve the quality of sport lessons.	✓ All teachers and many TAs are able to lead in tennis and hockey coaching. ✓ Teachers are confident to teach PE and sport. ✓ All staff wear PE clothing and engage in activity and feedback shows PE is seen as an important subject.
Invest in quality coaching.	✓ Magpies club in school to coach staff in sporting activities. ✓ Tennis coach and swimming coaches are supported by TA who join in with lessons.
Provide more opportunities for pupils to take part in inter-school competitions and develop their skills.	✓ Strong links with many local primary and secondary school in the area; including state schools, private schools, academies. ✓ Cricket, Olympics, rugby, football, netball, hockey, dance – all part of school. ✓ Supported secondary pupils through Duke of Edinburgh award by coaching in netball and using facilities through other companies.

Broaden the range of sporting opportunities.	✓ Greater access to more sporting activities particularly with the Magpies team who offer a range of coaches in different sports. ✓ More clubs on offer 6 days a week and school holiday time.

Impact of Participation in PE and Sport

- ▶ The school achieved the 'School Games Bronze Award' for the third time in a row
- ▶ School invited to open the Berkshire Games with their dance routine
- ▶ The school provides children with greater access and opportunity to attend after school clubs
- ▶ Successful introduction of a holiday club outside term time offering sports and training
- ▶ The school has secured good links with local public schools to access skilled coaches, top quality facilities and partnership work through sport
- ▶ Staff (teachers and assistants) are more confident to lead sport and PE across the school and dress accordingly. Engaging in off site training and when working with companies onsite (tennis & Magpies)
- ▶ Disadvantaged and vulnerable pupils are encouraged to take part in clubs and are financially supported where necessary for this to happen (Change for life and individual opportunities)
- ▶ Children lead the 'Sporting Challenge' during playtime and lunchtime which means more sporting activities are encouraged and available (pupil leadership in action)
- ▶ Children have access to a healthier and active lifestyle in and beyond the school day
- ▶ The school has better resources and equipment to engage in a wide range of sporting and P.E. activities
- ▶ Children are sports ambassadors for the school
- ▶ Swimming end of year 4 91% achieved swimming requirements (3 children were unable to swim 25 metres out of a class of 32)
