Meet the Headteacher—School Council Interview with Mrs O'Brien

James asked: Did you always want to be a Headteacher?

No! I liked sport and PE and wondered how I could use sport in a job and decided to become a teacher. I was a class teacher then took over when my Headteacher was having a baby. It just happened that I became a Headteacher!

Before teaching I had lots of different jobs. I was a waitress, I worked in a pub, I worked in summer camps and in a solicitor's office. I worked for a sofa company and a cryogenic company in the finance department. I started volunteering in a primary school and that's when I decided to train to be a teacher.

Max asked: How many hours do you work each day?

It's hard to say exactly but it's a long day. I get to school about 7.30am and then when I go home in the evenings I continue to work.

For example, I was answering emails at 9.30pm last night! It probably works out at 60-70 hours per week (including weekends).

Grace asked: What has been the most exciting thing you've done as a Headteacher?

Coming to Holy Trinity because of all the changes that have happened since then – we've got a new classroom, new playground surface, new curriculum and lots more! It's very exciting to see how the changes make the children happy and how they enjoy coming to school.

Rhys asked: Have you ever made any bad choices for the school?

Yes! I'm human! One of the hardest choices is times like sports day – to cancel or not? You can cause problems for a lot of families if you cancel or close the school. Just like the snow days we had recently.

Sadie asked: How long have you been teaching?

20 years.

Oliver asked: How do you choose which teachers work in each class?

I ask the teachers where they would like to teach and what is good for their career. It's like a jigsaw matching teachers to year groups – we try to be very fair. Some teachers like to change year groups and enjoy teaching children of different ages as it's a new challenge. Other teachers like to build on their teaching in a year group so they know it inside out.

Demi asked: Is this the first school you've been a Headteacher at?

No. I was a Headteacher at another school in Maidenhead before I came to Holy Trinity.

Edward asked: Is it a difficult job?

Yes – it's long hours. It's hard balancing my family with work. I tend to work mornings at weekends before my daughter wakes up then we have family time. Switching off sometimes is really hard, relaxing and not thinking about school work can be difficult. It's also hard to replace teachers when they leave; we have to make sure they are the right person to be joining our team here.

Isis asked: Have you taught all the classes?

In this school no – but in my career yes. My favourite is teaching Year 2 and working towards SATS. Y5 is quite challenging for me. I love working with children and I'll be teaching in Y3 with Mrs Griffith next term.

Chloe asked: What's your favourite part about being a Headteacher?

When children are happy, achieve well in their learning and win sport events or competitions I feel very proud to be the Headteacher. I really enjoy our school services in church and year class assemblies. I love being a Headteacher, I get to meet so many people all the time.

Bowen asked: What makes you happy in your job? Do you get frustrated when pupils don't do the right thing?

Children being happy makes me happy. I don't get frustrated or angry with children. I want to help them work out what the problem is and help them to fix it so they can deal with it better next time. Of course it helps when everyone follows the rules!

Manika asked: Does it take a lot of training to become the Headteacher?

You can get a qualification called an NPQH (National Professional Qualification for Headship). It takes a lot of experience and dedication. Of course experience working with children and adults is invaluable too and you have to prove you are good enough to do the job. We do lots of course work and projects and we have to answer a lot of questions.



Meet the Headteacher—School Council Interview with Mrs O'Brien—cont....

Zara asked: How did you become the Headteacher?

Well I came to look around and decided to apply for the position. I had an interview with the Governors and the Diocese that lasted all day! I had to meet lots of people and answers lots of questions about finance, being a church school, the curriculum, improvements needed, buildings, safeguarding, Health and Safety and lots more! Thankfully, the Governors offered me the job and I said yes!

Noah asked: Is it hard to run the school?

Sometimes. Most of the time it's a joy but at times it can be a challenge. My decisions can affect staff, parents and children so I have to plan things very carefully. If you have a good team like we do here at Holy Trinity, then we share the responsibilities and support each other.

Redevelopment of Sunningdale Park Site

As many of you will know the Sunningdale Park site is to be developed in the near future and a planning application is currently with RBWM awaiting comments from the public. It is notable that the development will mean opening the access road which is almost opposite to the junction with Church Road and Station Road. The analysis of current traffic flows and movements do not include this access as it isn't currently used at all. Further, it's not clear that the analysis carried out takes into account the movement of traffic around our school at key times during the day, which is already problematic.

The proposal includes introducing traffic calming measures opposite the school entrance gate with traffic priority in one direction, widening the road at one point and narrowing the road at another. This does not take into account how traffic movement will take place with the line of parked cars which exists at certain times of the day on Station Road, or the inappropriate parking by some of our parents.

The application has 258 documents and we have not had time to analyse them all. In the meantime we can point you towards Transport Assessment Part 1 page 57 which refers to a 'buildout' which will reduce the road to one carriageway outside the school gate, with this being shown in a diagram in Figure 10 in Transport Assessment Part 2. It is also unclear from this diagram how vehicles entering and leaving the school premises will interact with this 'buildout', which can include large vehicles at times and cars using the gate whilst children are arriving at and leaving the school site. The school have requested a meeting with representatives from RBWM but in the meantime we encourage you to look at the Planning Application and respond with your comments if you are able to do so. It is the volume of relevant comments that will influence the design of the road directly outside of the school gates.

All comments MUST be submitted by 30th March.
